Twenty-six years ago, Sheila and Val O'Donovan had a dream to create a hospice residence that would provide a pleasant, comfortable home for people with terminal cancer to spend their last days. Lisaard House welcomed its first resident in 2000 and, fifteen years later, Innisfree House opened its doors to continue to provide the Region of Waterloo with much needed hospice care for those facing a life-limiting illness.

In the years since both homes opened, over 6,500 residents spent their last days surrounded by their family and cared for by our team of compassionate staff and volunteers. At Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice, we put our residents and their families first as we guide them on their end-of-life journey. Our whole-person, individualized approach to care is made possible thanks to our community's ongoing and generous support.

A Message from our Executive Director

After two and a half years of pandemic restrictions, 2022 offered significant opportunities for us to carefully step forward towards a return to normal in our Houses.

Along with the number of residents starting to approach pre-pandemic numbers, our in-house volunteers began to return to their roles at reception, in the kitchens, and providing direct service to residents and families. Their re-entry into our Houses really highlighted how much their time and talents had been missed for so long! We were able to begin hosting our Bereavement Services onsite again. with our Family Time and Coffee Time groups returning in-person. We grew our Psychosocial and Spiritual Care services, and we restarted tours of our Houses, inviting families, local media, and other interested community partners to come in for a visit.

Outside of our walls, we advanced our partnership with two local Ontario Health Teams (OHT). In the Cambridge North Dumfries OHT. we solidified membership on their Joint Board, Membership, Quality Co-Design, and Patient/Family Advisory Committees. In the KW4 OHT, we positioned ourselves on their Membership Committee, and as a contributing organization on the Grand River Hospital Palliative Care Review Steering Committee. We also developed new partnerships with Supportive Housing of Waterloo, Bridges Shelter in Cambridge, the Business Networking International (BNI) Ontario KW chapter, and worked with Region of Waterloo Paramedic Services and Cambridge Memorial Hospital to help reduce overcrowding in the Emergency Department.

And 2022 wasn't without its challenges. Maintaining ideal clinical staffing ratios — as it was throughout our entire healthcare system — was a challenge for much of the calendar year, and fundraising has been difficult in an economical environment that delivered a cost-of-living crisis, tightening financial conditions, inflation, and ongoing uncertainty.

Throughout it all, we remain grateful. The resilience and commitment of our staff, volunteers, and physicians in supporting our residents and families has been outstanding. The generosity of our donors and sponsors has been incredible. Most of all, for the unconditional passion we all share for supporting our neighbours at a very difficult and sacred time in their lives is our privilege — and I thank you.

What's all the **Buss** about?

We're fostering bees

We're playing an important role with our local bee community in the region — the hives at Innisfree

House will host colonies of bees that require safe temporary housing before finding their permanent home. For example, if a local beekeeper determines their hives need splitting to regulate some of the busier bees, part of that colony will quickly and expertly be delivered to Innisfree House.

Bees play a crucial role as pollinators, and hosting these hives is an investment in our environment. We are repurposing some unused space on our property, and thousands of our tiny new colleagues began pollinating our gardens and marshland. At the end of each season, we'll have honey for guests and for use in our kitchens that was produced right in our own back yard.

With the support of skilled beekeepers maintaining their stay and ensuring they have enough forage, the bees will be in our care until the next leg of their travels — a poignant reflection of the work we do supporting our residents on their end-of-life journey.



AN UPDATE ON OUR **COMPASSIONATE CARE FUND**

Our Compassionate Care Fund is a special program we introduced that helps ensure access to our care is equitable for every individual that comes through our doors. We welcome residents who are end-of-life, including those from vulnerable and/or underserved populations. And while our hospice care is free of charge, there are some aspects of a resident's stay that may have an associated cost; this is where our Compassionate Care Fund becomes important.

Our staff are uniquely positioned to pick up cues that indicate a resident could benefit from our Compassionate Care Fund, and they will submit a request for leadership to review. Since introducing this program, we've been able to support residents and families with medical transfers to our Houses, special celebrations, medications not covered by OHIP, reusable tote bags for transporting residents' belongings, and cab fare and Grand River Transit passes (including MobilityPLUS) for family who don't drive.

It's an honour for us to be able support a resident's dignity in this way, and we are grateful to our donors who continue to give generously to this fund so that it's available for those who need a little extra help at a such a vulnerable time.

And we do it all with no cost to residents or their families.


We know we are only able to do this important work because of the generous support of our community; while we do receive some government funds, we have to raise nearly \$2 million annually.

Our Forest of Memories



We are so pleased to announce that, together with **rare** Charitable Research Reserve in Cambridge, we have created an exceptional space where the new Lisaard

& Innisfree Hospice Forest of Memories will live, offering another meaningful way to pay tribute to someone by having a tree planted on *rare*'s beautiful grounds.

The Forest of Memories has clear benefits to families and friends of our residents, including the fact that it will be a permanent part of the Reserve, and it also has benefits for the community at large – over time, the Forest of Memories will significantly contribute to increasing the local tree canopy through the plantings. And as it grows, the Forest of Memories will create a corridor that connects two existing woodland ecosystems, creating specialized habitat for many plants and animals, and increasing carbon retention.

A win for our families and our local portion of the planet!

How it works

Each tree is a one-time donation of \$150 (with a full tax receipt issued), and four native species of trees are available. When we receive a request for a tree, we'll reach out to our partners at **rare** to determine the most appropriate tree to plant. This will create a mix of species in the forest, ensuring the Forest of Memories stays healthy and ecologically balanced into the future. Family Story

JULIE MANSKE SHARES HER EXPERIENCE WITH LISAARD & INNISFREE HOSPICE



When Julie's mom was facing her final days in the hospital, she wanted to be at home, but she required more advanced care than could be provided there. Together with her family, she made the decision to move to Innisfree House, where she was in a home-like setting that

offered excellent round-the-clock care.

"My mom went to Innisfree House and spent two weeks less a day there. She was quite sick when she arrived, and it took about a day for her to really get settled. Once she did, I feel like she could have gotten up out of the bed and walked home — she felt so much better. I think part of it was not being in the hospital any longer, but most of it was the care, support, and beautiful surroundings she was experiencing here."

At Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice, we believe that people have the right to die with dignity, free from pain, surrounded by their loved ones in a setting of their choice. We are a compassionate community in which everyone has access to high-quality, seamless palliative care, where end-of-life choices are respected, and supports are readily available for individuals and their families through the end-of-life journey.

"It's hard to find the words for the miracle that happened with mom at Innisfree — the staff and volunteers swooped in and surrounded her with gentleness. They treated her like she was their own mom."

Julie was impressed by the level of individual care her mom received, remarking that not only was the room beautiful with a gorgeous view, they could bring in photos

and other mementos that helped her mom feel even more at home. "I didn't really understand what went on at a hospice, and that was sort of scarv to think about. And I was amazed — you don't feel like you're walking into doom and gloom, even though it was a sad time. From the moment we arrived, we saw a person smiling at the front desk, beautiful artwork, birds. I heard someone playing the piano, and we even saw a deer in the yard!"



"We're so grateful for the care my mom received at Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice —
I think every person deserves this kind of personal attention and to be in a
beautiful place like this at the end of their life."

"I know there is some funding, but it's not nearly enough to cover all the wonderful work that goes on here. I mean, spending those final moments with mom surrounded by love and care, not worrying about anything but being with her — that's priceless."

Julie and her family were able to sit down and enjoy their time with their mom without having to be her caretakers. "Here this woman is, coming into a strange place, and didn't know anyone; she wasn't feeling well, and within a day she felt calm and comfortable. Everything you can imagine is available at your fingertips — but it's not just that, it's also the quiet, the privacy, and the personal attention. The staff and volunteers are just incredible."

One volunteer really stood out to Julie and her mom — Bev, who comes in every Wednesday to bake fresh cranberry scones. "The staff had told me about this volunteer who comes in at 6:00 am every week, and I said to mom, 'wait until we can take you out to the kitchen to see her in action' — it was amazing!"

Julie's mom's practical side did emerge her first week at Innisfree House. Julie remarks, "She actually said to me, 'wow, Julie, who's paying for all this? Can you afford this?' and I was able to assure her that yes, everything was taken care of."

For over 30 collective years, Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice has helped thousands of individuals in our community face a life-limiting diagnosis. Our staff and volunteers are committed to Making Moments Matter by providing attention far above and beyond what would typically be expected at home or in the hospital. And we do it all with no cost to residents or their families. We know we are only able to do this important work because of the generous support of our community; while we do receive some government funds, we have to raise nearly \$2 million annually.












