Because of our experience, like many families, we wanted to give back to help further their supportive work. To this day, our family continues to raise funds through

MAKING MOMENTS MATTER

Jennifer Escobar shares why giving back to Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice honours the generous spirit of her sister, Jeannie

After battling a brain tumor for years, it became evident in 2014 that further treatment was unlikely to provide meaningful relief, and that, sadly, 42-year-old Jeannie Escobar was facing her final days.

With a husband and two young boys, Jeannie was always both optimistic and pragmatic about her diagnosis, and had made it clear she didn't want to die at home. Hospitalized, in a coma, with days to live, her medical team cautioned that moving her from hospital was risky. "But the hospital is a medical facility, and we were determined to get her the next best option to home — Lisaard House," explains her sister Jennifer, "and it was the best decision we could have made."

For nearly 30 collective years, Lisaard & Innisfree Hospice has helped thousands of individuals in our community facing a life-limiting illness, providing compassionate care and support for them and their families. We believe that end-of-life deserves the same attention, care, and respect that is offered at the beginning of life, and the Escobars wanted this special care for Jeannie.

Though Jeannie was in a coma for most of her month-long stay at Lisaard House, Jennifer shared that "our family was able to talk with her and do all the things we knew she would enjoy — we staged reiki drumming, held healing circles, performed religious services, we took Jeannie outside in her bed, we enjoyed the music therapy, and we could even stay overnight if we wanted."

The around the clock care the family experienced was incredible. "And we are a very big family... one day, I counted thirty of us in and around Lisaard House. The staff

always made us feel so welcome, they never suggested there were too many of us...but after that day, I ended up telling people to space out their visits," says Jennifer with a laugh.

Our hospice Houses are designed specifically to have both privacy and gathering spaces for residents and families, and beautiful grounds that can be enjoyed. Jennifer recalls their family being encouraged to 'be themselves' when they were visiting - which helped maintain a sense of normalcy during a vulnerable time. Their youngsters could play soccer, catch frogs in the marsh, watch the birds, and even arranged play dates with their friends. The Escobars became close with another family at Lisaard going through a similar experience - a young parent at end-of-life with young kids. "Their two boys developed a relationship with Jeannie's two boys, and we became a kind of support for each other, which was amazing," remarks Jennifer.

In her lifetime, Jeannie Escobar demonstrated the importance of giving back, and her generosity of spirit lives on in her family. Over the past eight years, they have continued to give back to Lisaard & Innisfree in donations of money, goods, and sweat equity. In gratitude for their experience, they created huge pantry and office supply donation drives, donated plants for our gardens, asked for donations in lieu of wedding gifts, and assembled a crew of teenagers to clean up the gardens, to name a few. Jennifer's 13-yearold daughter, Mya, launched a Facebook fundraising page, creating and selling paintings, masks, and jewellery, and donating all the proceeds to Lisaard House.

She even arranges events like Bubblegum Day at school to help support the work we do!

When asked what compels the Escobars to keep giving back over the years, Jennifer didn't hesitate "The work you

do is so important. We want to keep Jeannie's memory and spirit of giving alive, and we're making sure other families can enjoy the same kind of care we did. And we'll continue to support for as many other families as possible — we are all so grateful for this treasure in our community."
